Introduction

ometimes an author chooses the subject; other times the subject chooses the author. *365 Tarot Spreads* was a case of the latter; this book chose me.

You'll discover, as I did, a plethora of 365 books if you look for them. Daily books of spells, goddesses, simple advice, daily living, sexual positions, creativity guides, meditations, journaling suggestions, recipes, happiness boosters, motivations, and ideas *ad infinitum* for each day of the year.

I was pleasantly surprised to discover no tarot book for each day of the year existed, especially since for many cartomancers (a fancy name for tarot lovers), tarot is a hallowed daily practice. Pulling daily cards is not only an excellent tarot learning tool but a ritual for what I'd imagine are hundreds of thousands of readers.

Even my sister, director of a large drug addiction rehabilitation facility in the healing airs of Malibu, California, pulls a card from her mermaid deck for guidance and inspiration before important meetings. She wouldn't describe herself as a tarotist, but she understands the importance of a clear, concise message or theme when one is needed and the usefulness of a card as a focal point when focus is called for.

This is the sublime nature of tarot: tarot pulls focus. It gives your attention a resting point. The dialogue a reader has with their cards is a rapid-fire, emotion-filled experience leading to informed decision-making and change. Why? Because we tend to live in our heads and in the experience of our brains. Tarot brings us out of ourselves. It moves our perception outwards and onto the cards

before us. Rather than living with the possibility imagined in our mind's eye, the possibility is spread on the table before us. This small bit of space—this foot or two of distance between reader and cards—allows us perspective. Like the value of age and wisdom, tarot spreads allow us to step back, reevaluate, and consider motives, actions, and outcomes from a different vantage point. In this space intuition leaps to life and we actively listen for guidance.

For many of us, this is done on a daily basis. So why not create a tarot spread for each and every day of the year?

On Questioning

The root of a question is a quest—a journey, act, or instance of seeking or pursuing something. A tarot reading is a search, a journey, a quest for truth. Tarot decks lie in wait for your questions: "What do I want to know, see, meditate on—?" The first thing a tarot reader asks the client is, "What do you want to know?" To come to tarot is to come with a curious mind. A tarot spread can alter the course of your life—or not; it is entirely up to you. Will you sit on the information gathered or will you act on it?

At some point in the process of writing this book, it occurred to me that there must be a set number of questions someone could ask about themselves and their life. While each individual's journey is infinite, the language surrounding the journey, the articulation of those questions, must have a set limit. The questions wouldn't include the likes of "What makes volcanoes erupt?" though you can ask tarot anything you want. This book is concerned with questions in regard to one's life: "Does he love me? Am I making the right choice? What should I do?" There are small differences in how questions are phrased, but the essential quest, search, desire, and intended or hoped for outcome is essentially a set number. This is why most tarot readings come down to the same few subjects: love, money, career, and life path.

Interestingly, the relatively small number of questions one could ask doesn't make the experience of life feel small; it's quite the opposite. Magic and uniqueness occur in the way we color our existence. We are far from robots operating in a factory line of mindless repetition. A simple description of the human body states two arms, two legs, one heart, one brain. On the surface, this appears simple, set, and staid. But the way we inhabit our bodies is unique. Therein lies infinity. And if you don't believe me, look at the bodies ambling down Forty-Second Street in New York City. Gaze at ballet dancers leaping across the stage. Watch toddlers move. Infinity exists amidst essentials.

Small, finite sets of human existence are apparent everywhere. The twelve signs of the zodiac cover the fundamental qualities indicative of the human psyche, thus millions of people look at the same horoscope and say, "Yes. This is me!" Shakespeare's thirty-seven plays comprise the essential dramatic narrative of human existence. He's told all of our stories. The Hero's Journey is apparent in cross-cultural mythology. Its narrative arc is rife through the major arcana and resonates with every person on earth. All religious dogma boils down to a handful of essential truths. Our life ultimately contains a few vital themes, issues, and problems. We find ourselves continually working out these same issues over and over again. Even sacred geometry tells us nature is made of repetitive patterns. The tiny spiral of a black snail in morning sunlight is the same shape of spiral galaxies light years away in outer space. Everything repeats.

With repetitiveness comes opportunity—a chance to do something again, to cultivate newness, to reach higher, to love deeper, to become smarter. And if we are lucky—if we work hard, if we question well amidst the repetition— something Charles Darwin referred to as "saltation" occurs: *the pattern changes*.

On Being Human

The Epic of Gilgamesh is one of humanity's earliest surviving works of literature and the subject of a college lecture I think of often. "Why do we care?" asks Ron Long, professor of religion at Hunter College. "Why bother to read this ancient story? Why does it matter?" Great question. Why consider an old story like *Gilgamesh*? Why study a 4,000-year-old adventure about two best friends?

"It matters," Long explains, "because it is what makes us human." The second half of the epic focuses on Gilgamesh's heartbreak and distress when his best friend is killed. Gilgamesh's sorrow is excruciating and sends him off on a quest for immortality. Long's point is that the sudden loss of a best friend for a person living 4,000 years ago is as heartfelt, as tragic, as it is for us today. Four thousand years later we remain the same delicate, fragile, and emotional creatures we have always been. External circumstances may be different—we may fly in airplanes rather than ride camels to traverse deserts—but at our core, we are the same. We are human.

Approaching *365 Tarot Spreads*, I encountered, once again, that not much separates us from our ancestors or our neighbors. The challenge was writing a book where anyone, anywhere, could discover a set of questions applicable to their current situation, desires, and needs—to make it possible for anyone, in any situation, to find articulation for their quest.

It is the same goal a professional tarot reader faces: to offer insight and information to the people who come to them. People from all walks of life cross the path of the professional reader: young, old, wealthy, poor, bored, excited, depressed, enthused. The professional tarot reader becomes an inadvertent sociologist. Within the intimate framework of a reading, be it a five-or fifty-minute session, as complete strangers bare their hearts and souls, a delicate lesson is learned and relearned. We are the same. *We are human*.

From Superbowl athletes to Little League coaches, from movie starlets to housekeepers, from the wealthy to the poor, it doesn't matter; each person yearns for love and validation as much as you do. People's questions are the same. No matter class, color, or creed, everyone wants love, security, and acceptance from their peers. Everyone desires a sense of belonging and purpose. Our essential needs and desires remain the same.

I get the feeling that if any of us sat in ancient Babylon in the corner of a bar, reading tarot for those Babylonians, the questions asked would be the same questions people ask today because we are all human. We all feel scared, we all feel rejection, we are all uncertain, we all have highs and lows. At our core we are all the same.

Why does any of this matter? Because it means we are not alone.

On Time

Writing a book for each day of the year, one begins to consider with greater interest the nature of a calendar. What is it and why? Calendars exist to mark the passage of time. Ancient people crawled out of caves, and as summer days grew longer, they knew more sunlight meant greater safety from the hungry beasts lurking in darkness. Our first calendars were the glittering constellations, our night sky. In agricultural societies, calendars let us know when to plant and harvest. Calendar knowledge equaled survival. The Industrial Revolution brought calendars and clocks telling factory workers when to get up and go to work. We are not much different than our farming or factory-working forebears. We use time to coordinate busy lives, careers, schedules, knowing when and where to be. At the movies, we calculate with precision the time it takes to get our popcorn before the previews begin.

But time offers us something more on a profound level: security. Life's true nature is terrifying; it is random. On a deep level we intellectually realize Earth is literally spinning beneath our feet, hurtling through space. We know, on the other side of the world, people are literally upside down from us but feel right-side up to themselves. We know from the painful lessons of tragedy that life can change in the blink of an eye. But time is something we can depend upon. Humanity's agreement of time is regulated. If you buy a ticket to see Bruno Mars next Saturday at 8 PM, 25,000 other people will show up right alongside you to hear the Mars man sing. The dependability and agreeability of time makes it a comforting thing, so calendars prevail and a year is sliced into 365 sunrises and sunsets.

But time is a slippery subject. None of us know how much time we have. When we find out our time is up, it will be too late. Why, when we were ten years old, did a summer last forever but fly in the blink of an eye at age thirty? Maybe because children live in terms of possibility, while adults tend to live in relation to the past. We all fall prey to living in relation to the past. But tarot intercedes. Tarot contains a gift. Tarot, like childhood, presents us with the possible. Each time we flip a card, we sense the possibility. This is why no matter how many years you've worked with tarot, every time you pull a card feels like the first time you've ever done so; it's why tarot never loses its excitement. Tarot makes virgins of all of us.

Author Jeanette Winterson says time stops everything from happening at once. She says there are two times: that time belonging to the outer world—to the calendar, Earth's revolutions around the sun—and time in our personal inner world, our inner landscape. Inside ourselves, we experience events as if time were happening simultaneously. To challenge linear time, realize that events separated by years lie side by side imaginatively and emotionally inside of you. She suggests an attempt to live in total time. While abiding by the time on my computer, I simultaneously feel the warmth of my first real kiss, the thrill running down my spine, the smell of his skin, the song playing in the background. I am fourteen and I am forty-two, in two places at once. Can you do this? Of course you can. You are a supernatural creature. You too can live in total time.

It is the province of the tarot reader to move backwards, forwards, even sideways in time. It is what we do best. Readers, our cards—our imaginations lie outside of calendar time. These are the highways, landscapes, and environments visited by shamans, artists, seers, and mystics—the world of the imagination. Story, essence, truth, gods, eternity, and symbols exist here. This is why tarot is a gateway to worlds of esoteric study, why tarot is an entrance to the occult. Because what is hidden can only be revealed by experience. Archetypes are experiential. Tarot is experiential.

This is what Greece's ancient mystery schools offered. Their lessons could not be taught, explained, or orated. The lessons had to be experienced. You can't know the mystery until you experience the mystery. A boy in a New Guinea tribe cannot be lectured on his initiatory experience. He is given tools for survival for his three-day initiation in the woods. He is equipped and taught to fend off wild beasts, but his experience occurs alone. He quests for himself. He comes through the process changed. This is exactly what the Fool does. This is what tarot does. It is what you will do if you allow it. This quest occurs outside of calendar time. It is entirely internal. And *365 Tarot Spreads* is here for you on the outside, provoking you with questions and ideas when you need them.

I hope you enjoy this book—hope it aids you, no matter your quest. May the roads you choose be filled with magic and wonder, with galaxies of possibility and oceans of love. Hopefully you'll never have to use the Divorce Spread, the Rejection Spread, or the Letting Go Spread. But life is full of bumps and bruises just as it is full of soft baby kisses and snuggles, so the spreads are there in case you need them.

I hope you find your truth and that when you do, you stand in the middle of it strong, beautiful, and nimble like the World dancer. Because when the Fool followed her own path and trusted herself, she found herself in the World. And by the time she did, she was so high on the music—so enraptured by the dancing, so lost in the beauty, so in tune with herself, and so filled with magic—she didn't even realize that she'd arrived at her destination.

On This Day

Welcome to the first day of the year! New Year's resolutions have been made; many will be broken. Now is the perfect time to create a vision board to usher the bold and beautiful into your life. Rather than merely contemplating resolutions, a vision board helps you spring toward action.

Julius Caesar established January 1 as the first day of the year in 46 BCE. This was partly to honor the god Janus, for whom January is named.

Summation of Spread

A vision board is a collection of images placed where you can see it clearly. You select and assemble images to bring change, manifestation, and direction into your life. Use the Vision Board Spread whenever you begin construction on a new vision board.



The Hermit shuts himself from the world to cultivate wisdom. This equates with the meditative state one enters when going through the process of selecting images. When the Hermit emerges, he shines his vision from his lamp, a six-pointed star. It lights the path of enlightenment for those who would follow.

Cast Your Cards

This spread lays out like a vision board. Use this spread for inspiration while creating your dreams in visual form. Nine questions are proposed because nine is the number of wish fulfillment. Cast your cards well—and happy visioning!

- 1. What is the overriding theme of my vision board?
- 2. What are my wildest dreams?
- 3. What types of images resonate with me?
- 4. Can I let go emotionally and mentally in my selection process?
- 5. Where do I want to travel?
- 6. How do I want to make a difference?
- 7. What do I want to attract into my life?
- 8. What tiny adjustment can I make to manifest this vision board?
- 9. What happens when I take action on my dreams?

Speak with Ancestors Spread

On This Day

Ancestors' Day (*Jour des Aieux*) occurs today on the tropical island of Haiti. The celebration rings in the new year while honoring the past. Haitians remember those who have died within the previous twelve months and pay homage to those who perished fighting for Haitian independence in the early nineteenth century.

How do you know you are really communicating with an ancestor? Tarot teacher Ruth Ann Amberstone explains, "Simply trust yourself. You will know when they are speaking. You will know when they have left."

Summation of Spread

Would you like to speak to your ancestors? Communicate with the spirit world using tarot. Conversations with guides, angels, and ancestors will spring forth between cards and candle. Use this spread to converse with souls of family members who have gone before you.



The Ten of Pentacles represents pedigree, bloodlines, and the family tree. Complete, strong, and resistant to the ravages of time, it is the card of evolution and kindred connection. Drawing this card is a reminder we play but a small role in the tapestry of a larger generational story.

Cast Your Cards

Family magic and wisdom is collected by casting your cards in the shape of a family tree.

- 2. What talent thrives in our family?
- 3. What is the overlying challenge or lesson of our family?
- 4. What is the legacy I hold?

On This Day

The feast of Saint Genevieve, patron saint of Paris, is celebrated today. Genevieve reported frequent visions of heavenly saints and angels from a young age. Graced with clairvoyance and miracle working, it is said her prayers and fasting saved Paris from a harrowing attack from Attila the Hun in 451 CE. Legend also states when her relics (pieces

Everyone reacts to subtle energies, whether we realize it or not. People, events, animals, and the natural world all affect how we feel.

of her body kept as objects of reverence) were carried through the streets during the Parisian plague in 1129, she miraculously intervened to stop the spread of the plague as the death toll plummeted.

Summation of Spread

Channel St. Genevieve's good graces when you feel the need for extra strength and protection. The questions ponder from whom, how, and why you might need extra security and care.



The Queen of Wands maintains the strongest energetic field in the deck because she commands the element of fire, passion, and spirituality. If you plan on reading tarot for others, energetic protection and grounding is important. It is possible to unintentionally absorb the querent's energies, both positive and negative.

Cast Your Cards

Witches often raise cones of energy (recall the symbolism of a witch's hat) when needing kinetic protection. Imagine a cone of protective white light around you while casting your cards.

Big Purchase Spread

Industrialist Cornelius Vanderbilt, one of the wealthiest men of American history, died on this day in 1877. Leaving most of his fortune to his son Henry, who doubled it, this patriarch is ancestor to Gloria Vanderbilt and Anderson Cooper. The Vanderbilts created luxurious residences, many of which are open today for public touring, and left a legacy of philanthropy including Vanderbilt University and the Medical School at Columbia University.

Cornelius Vanderbilt embodied the American dream. Quitting school at age eleven, he started a ferry business shuttling passengers between Manhattan and Staten Island. On his deathbed, he'd amassed a 100million-dollar fortune in shipping and railroads.

Summation of Spread

Are you about to make a large purchase? The Big Purchase Spread uses captains of finance for inspiration when contemplating financial decisions. Summon a Vanderbilt with your cards and invest wisely.




The Ace of Pentacles

represents the revitalization of finance, new forms of income, and the manifestation of a goal. The fertile garden indicates that growth is essential. Money spent is returned twofold, and often it represents a financial windfall or inheritance.

Bird's-Eye View Spread

On This Day

National Bird Day is observed today. Dedicated to the admiration and preservation of birds, it also raises people's awareness for birds held in captivity. Unbound by human laws of nature, birds often represent a link between conscious and subconscious, heaven and earth, groundedness and possibility. Birds are universally understood as a symbol for soul, anima, freedom, or the world soul hidden in matter.

Birds are often seen as messengers, heralds of change, or spirits of the deceased.Their singing wakes us with the spirit of instinct, inner voice, and the beginning and end to our days.

Muddled by decisions? Confused about your path? Taking a bird's-eye view offers a unique way to evaluate your life and choices. This helpful strategy asks you to float up and look at your life from a bird's perspective. This wide angle renders small things as they truly are—insignificant—and focuses on what is truly important in the grand scheme of life.



The Nine of Pentacles holds a fierce falcon on her delicately gloved hand. This falcon represents loyalty. Bird images in tarot represent the highest aspects of our being taking flight and the ability to reach beyond our normal perceptions and boundaries.

Shuffle your cards while thinking about the question at hand. Eyes closed, start throwing cards on the table in front of you. Look down like a god from above to discover which cards land upright and face you. Read these cards left to right to answer the Bird's-Eye View Spread's questions.

- 2. What didn't I see before?
- 3. How do I best see the overall view?
- 4. What becomes apparent when looking down from above?
- 5. Where am I heading?
- 6. What is truly important?

Kick a Bad Habit Spread

Today, the twelfth day after Christmas, or Twelfth Night, is known as Little Christmas in Ireland. Older calendars that use the Julian calendar mark today as the traditional Christmas celebration. Modern practices dictate today as the traditional end of the holiday season, when trimmings are removed and festoons are swept away till next year.

Every habit starts with a psychological pattern called a "habit loop." This three-part process begins with a trigger, is followed by a routine, and ends with behavior. Understanding cue, routine, and reward, simply change the routine to something healthy and positive.

Why not rid a bad habit as you clean? Remove decorations and make this task a magical metaphor. Decide a bad habit will be removed right along with holiday frill. This spread helps you identify and remove pesky habits, and it's best done before decoration removal.



Swords are the wickedly sharp suit of elimination. Swords can feel frightful because they represent thoughts, calculation, and change. Embrace the fierceness of a sword when slicing away a habit.

In your mind's eye, picture yourself free of the habit. Imagine yourself as you'd like to be. In a calm and focused manner, cast the cards in the shape of the holiday garland soon to be removed.

Excellent Eating Habits Spread

The Fannie Farmer Cookbook, a gastronomic classic, was published this day in 1896. Its emphasis on good foods, fresh flavor, and variety is why it remains a favorite to this day.

Fannie Farmer suffered a stroke at age sixteen. Unable to walk, she took up cooking, giving her mother's boarding house a reputation for amazing meals. Publishing cookbooks and opening a cooking school, her story reminds us that our greatest tragedies often define who we are.

The consumption and preparation of food is a connection to the life force itself—an opportunity to indulge in pleasure and health simultaneously. If you plan to change eating habits, emphasize the positive rather than dwell on the negative. This spread focuses on cultivating excellent eating habits.



The Three of Pentacles depicts three figures in discussion about the building of a sacred space. Often representing collaboration, you can also understand this card as growing in healthy ways and the sacred space being your body.

Notice bright sunlight dappling your kitchen, feel the health radiating from a juicy apple, and cast your cards.

Get Out of Debt Spread

In 1835, President Andrew Jackson rose to make an announcement few presidents have had the honor of making: "Gentlemen, the national debt is paid." It was the first time the nation was debt-free, and it lasted for one year.

Not all debt is bad. Borrowing for a home or education makes financial sense if you do not overborrow and can afford the monthly payments.


Being debt-free releases anxiety, allows you to save, and gives you the freedom to choose what you spend money on. Today's spread uses this auspicious day to begin a dialogue with yourself about your debt situation.



The King of Pentacles is associated with great wealth. He excels in business, real estate, and practical matters, and he is serious about his financial situation. His scepter represents power and he sits in the very kingdom he has created. He is generous, reliable, and patient.

Imagine yourself debt-free. Take a breath. Know that you build confidence and stability with each card you cast.

Mermaid Magic Spread

Christopher Columbus, sailing near the Dominican Republic, spotted three mermaids on this day in 1493. He reported them to be "not half as beautiful as they are painted." In truth, Columbus was looking at manatees, slow-moving aquatic mammals with gentle eyes and large, long bodies.

Mermaid skin is known to be hard as diamonds, protecting the creature from the cold watery depths. It is often said a mermaid caress upon human skin leaves a shimmering mark like fairy dust.

Mermaid legends have existed in seafaring cultures since ancient Greece. Some folklore states they can take human form and marry men. Sensual, elusive, and undeniably female, mermaid symbolism inspires questions designed to unleash mermaid magic in your life.



The Queen of Cups connects to mermaid magic as she rules from her throne at the sea. Speaking the language of whales and dolphins, her elusive watery emotional qualities make for empathy whose depths know no bounds.

Toss your long locks, bask in the sun, smell salty sea air, and cast your cards.

- 1. Elusiveness: How can I remain mysterious to the one I love?

- 3. Allure: Which of my personal qualities is most alluring?
- 4. Privacy: What must be kept under wraps?

Artist Georgia O'Keeffe was awarded the Presidential Medal of Freedom by President Ford today in 1977. Famous for her largescale flower paintings and rock-and-bone New Mexico subjects, O'Keeffe is one of the great artists of the twentieth century.

Ancient Greeks held Muses as the inspiration for literature, science, and the arts. Nine muses inspired specific subjects: Epic Poetry, History, Love Poetry, Song, Tragedy, Hymns, Dance, Comedy, and Astronomy.

In addition to her own work, Georgia O'Keeffe acted as primary muse to her husband, photographer Alfred Stieglitz. His early nudes of O'Keeffe caused a huge sensation. By retirement, he'd made over 350 portraits of her. This spread uses the couple's creative process to help you invoke your muse.



The Queen of Swords is associated with novelists and writers of all sorts due to her keen finesse with words and articulation. Note the Queen of Swords' hand gesture. Her extended hand represents an invitation and activation of the muse.

Muses derive from Greek mythology. Modern usage refers to them as something or someone with the ability to excite innovative passions and call forth fertile creative ideas and illuminations. This spread seeks your muse to aid in any project. To find her, clear the decks and cast your cards.



The x-ray uses an X because when German physicist Wilhelm Roentgen discovered a new form of radiation by accident in 1895, he did not know what it was. Therefore, he called it an xray.

Who wouldn't love the ability to see through items, people, and walls? X-ray vision is a popular superpower for heroes like Superman. Luckily, tarot can take an x-ray survey of any situation you encounter.



The Page, or Knave, of Swords, often described as the Nancy Drew of the tarot deck, possesses x-ray vision that he projects at will. His searching eyes and rapid-fire brain see through any deception, straight to the heart of the matter, and discover the truth to any situation.

Using your powers of perception wisely, cast the cards of the X-ray Vision Spread in the shape of an *X* to mark the spot.

Knights Templar Spread

The Knights Templar were sanctioned by Pope Honorius today in 1128. The Templars grew in size and popularity, gaining so much wealth and influence that by 1307, King Philip of France and Pope Clement V conspired to bring them down. Tortured into false confessions and convicted of heresy, sacrilege, and satanism, many burned at the stake.

Friday the thirteenth is considered an inauspicious day because the Grand Master of the Knights Templar, Jacques de Molay, along with hundreds of Templars, was arrested and imprisoned on Friday, October 13, 1307.

Knights swear with oaths, vows, and codes of conduct, and these pledges color future actions. The questions in this spread are based on the core tenets of knighthood.



Tarot knights are often messengers bearing news. Read the energy of your situation by paying close attention to the speed of the knight's horses. A fast horse equals a speedy resolution, while a slow horse means more time will elapse.

The Ace of Cups suggests acts of love, empathy, and compassion as a way of healing any situation, both toward yourself and the wounded party. The dove represents peace, the water indicates the subconscious mind, and the water lilies symbolize eternal life.

Carmenta is derived from the Latin carmen, meaning a magic spell, oracle, or song. It is also the root of the English word charm.


Are you ready to invoke the powers of a goddess? Access Carmenta's divination and ultimate feminine graces with this special spread, excellent for personal empowerment on every level.




saint who survived a series of horrific demons in a Majorcan cave and lived to tell.

Power: The Secrets of Tantric and Shaktic Yoga is the source of many modern Western adaptations of the Kundalini yoga practice.

Let your inner serpent rise. Kundalini is described as a dormant force coiled at the base of the spine. Through practice, it rises through the chakras and into the head, producing a profound mystical experience. The Tantric Kundalini Spread is inspired by the notion of your energetic serpent rising through your chakras, lighting you up as it goes.



The Ace of Wands represents the power of Kundalini fire. A symbol of strength, vitality, and energy, this ace provides the transformation of our world through desire.



Cleopatra's Needle has no real connection with the queen of Egypt. The needle's inscriptions by Ramesses II that commemorated his military victories were already over a thousand years old before Cleopatra's lifetime. The needle was moved to one of her temples years after its creation.

The Egyptian Book of the Dead explains the complex Egyptian concept of a human soul's life after death. Grave robbing was considered a horrible crime in ancient Egypt. To do so robbed the departed's chance to live in the afterlife. The Cleopatra's Needle Spread uses Egyptian concepts of the afterlife to inform its questions.





The Egyptians describe a profound journey for the soul in the afterlife, just as the major arcana describes a metaphorical journey from the Fool to the World. Some interpretations claim the Fool's pouch contains the four tarot symbols, which he must learn to use during his journey.

The amount of sunlight that falls on the earth's surface in one minute is sufficient to meet the world's energy demand for one year.



In addition to political prowess, Winston Churchill was a prolific painter. Discovering his passion for oil painting after the age of forty, he would produce almost 600 works in his life.

Churchill failed sixth grade and was defeated in every election for public office until becoming prime minister at age sixty-two. He encouraged others to never, ever give up. His bright spirit informs this spread, created to examine whether you should walk away from a challenge or try harder.

Saraswati, Hindu goddess of music, arts, science, and knowledge, is honored today in Eastern India. Her symbols include a book (divine knowledge), a crystal (power of meditation and spirituality), sacred water (creativity and purification), and a musical instrument (perfection of arts and sciences, the rhythm of music, emotions and feelings).

Flow is one of the main reasons people play video games. Intrinsic motivation is aroused; skill and challenge utilize the player's brain. Their attention is engaged and motivation is high while the goals of the game are clearly set. All sense of time disappears.

Saras, "flow," and *wati*, "she who has," mean "she who has flow." Flow describes the mental state of a person performing an activity who is fully involved, has energized focus, and feels intense enjoyment. The questions of this spread are posed to promote flow in the creative activity of your choice.



The World card personifies the concept of flow. The World dancer moves in a state of ecstasy, tuning in and perfectly centered in the moment. The consciousness has finally merged with the subconscious, and the result is a superconscious state of transcendence.

While a sense of flow can happen spontaneously, you can create favorable circumstances for it and find activities that promote it by casting your cards.

Wald and Ruth Ann Amberstone were married in 2002 at their New York Tarot Festival. Lon Milo DuQuette and Mary Greer officiated, and the ceremony was full of tarot symbolism and personal spiritual references.


Making a tough choice? The clarity and discrimination needed for decision making comes with the suit of Swords. Wald and Ruth Ann created the Double-Edged Sword Spread for use with any challenging question. From relationships to job offers to moving to career paths, you can examine the ramifications of each choice.



Swords always represent thoughts and communication. Ambition, power, and conflict are typical themes emerging in a spread that has multiple Sword cards. Choose wisely before action is taken.

Shuffle the cards and cut your deck into two piles. Assign one pile for choice #1 and the other pile for choice #2. From the first pile, draw five cards and place in a vertical line. Draw five more cards, placing in second vertical line, representing the alternative choice.

While the layout is simple, the interpretation is subtle. There are no specific positions assigned to these cards. Each row reads as a multifaceted picture of energies and outcome. Sometimes the answer is obvious; other times both choices contain pros and cons. Compare and notice the strengths and trouble spots of each side. The responses will aid when making your final decision.

Candlemas Candle Magic Spread

Candlemas is an ancient British festival marking the midpoint of winter. Before the advent of electricity, dark interiors were illuminated with candlelight and fires. On this particular day, all the year's candles were brought to the church, and blessings were made over them. It was known as a festival day or the mass of the candles, thus creating Candlemas. Scottish children contributed candles to school on Candlemas so the classrooms remained bright. When gas

In Scotland, the boy or girl bringing in the most money is declared the Candlemas King or Queen. They "rule" for six weeks and have the power to make one whole afternoon playtime.

lighting was installed, children brought money to the teacher for sweets and cakes instead.

Candle magic is accomplished via simple or complex rituals. This is based on the essential elements of candle magic. Use this spread when planning a ritual or simply examining a goal.

Are you being held captive by a situation, person, or thought? This spread aims to help you break free.



The Grimm Brothers's tale **Snow White and Rose Red** features another character named Snow White who bears no relation to Snow White and the Seven Dwarfs.


The questions of this spread are inspired by the themes and symbols of this iconic fairy tale.


Peter Pan's theme is the conflict between the innocence of childhood versus the responsibility of adulthood. This tug of war is a universal experience. Aphrodite is associated with the sea, dolphins, doves, swans, pomegranates, scepters, apples, myrtle, rose trees, lime trees, clams, scallop shells, and pearls.

Do you have your eye on a special someone? This lusty spread will help you seduce the one you love.



The Empress card connects to Aphrodite's femininity, passion, and loveliness. While the Empress is not a literal interpretation of Aphrodite, the Empress is the embodiment of female sensuality, physicality, fleshiness, and physical beauty.

Aphrodite's Bombshell Spread's cards are cast in the shape of the delicate, fragile human organ, the heart.


Nose twitching, mouth covering, fidgeting, and tense lips are signs a person might be lying. Other signs include microexpressions, quick flashes of emotion the liar is attempting to cover up.

Are you honest with others and with yourself? Pinocchio's Truthfulness Spread plays upon elements of truth as a central theme. The questions posed regard all areas of truthfulness in our lives.



The King of Cups is connected to lying, fabrication, and tall tales. While the King of Cups is not inherently deceitful, he is the tarot personality with the broadest imagination. The rolling sea and cresting waves he sits upon are reminders of extraordinary ingenuity and imaginative capacity.

Tree of Life Spread

Eliphas Levi was born on this day in 1810. Levi changed tarot usage forever by placing it at the center of all occult sciences. He felt tarot was the common ground where various philosophies intermingled.

Levi influenced the work of the Golden Dawn and all of twentieth-century magic by committing his life to metaphysical study and magical practice.

Levi associated tarot with the Kabbalah (Jewish mysticism) by linking the twentytwo letters of the Hebrew alphabet to twentytwo corresponding trump cards. The Tree of Life is a mystical way of understanding the creation of the universe and our connection to divinity. This spread is inspired by the Sephiroth (places on the Tree of Life) to inform its questions.



The Magician card connects to Levi as a magician. Tarot's four suits are displayed upon his table. Levi connected the four suits (elements) with the four letters of the Tetragrammaton, which is considered the proper name of God in the Hebrew bible.

Collision of the Elements Spread

The US Weather Service was established on this day in 1870, providing forecasts, warnings, safety, and general information for the public.

The National Weather Service, a governmental agency, was originally placed under the Department of War when it was formed. Congress felt "military discipline would probably secure the greatest promptness, regularity, and accuracy in the required observations."

This tempestuous spread uses weather events to inform questions about the winds of change operating in your life.



The World card represents the manifestation of the elements in your life. Note the creatures in each corner: lion (Fire), bull (Earth), eagle (Air), and cherub (Water). These elements are also representative of the four fixed signs of the zodiac: Leo, Taurus, Aquarius, and Scorpio. They point to the four seasons, the four compass points, and the four corners of the universe.

Look skyward and feel Earth, Air, Fire, and Water collide to make the weather as you cast your cards like pollen in the wind.

Snakes are a widespread mythological symbol in many cultures. Dualistic in nature, they are symbolic of both good and evil, life and death.

is celebrated with processions, drinking, tossing confetti, and family gatherings.


What do snakes symbolize for you? The questions of this spread are inspired by snakes and snake bites because subconsciously they represent confronting undesirable or uncontrollable situations and the loss of power or control over yourself or circumstances.



Rider-Waite-Smith (RWS) cards make full use of snake symbolism. The Magician's belt is an ouroboros, an ancient symbol of a snake devouring itself, representing eternal return. The Lovers card features a snake whispering to the female. The Wheel of Fortune contains a serpent, while in the Seven of Cups a snake slithers out of the top righthand cup.

Salome's Dance of Seven Veils Spread

Oscar Wilde's play *Salome*, based on the biblical story, premiered on the Paris stage while he sat in prison on this day in 1896. Salome performs the sensual dance of seven veils in exchange for the severed head of John the Baptist. The dance of seven veils is thought to originate with Babylonian fertility goddess Ishtar.

When Ishtar, goddess of sexuality and warfare, approached the underworld, the gatekeeper allowed her to pass through seven gates, one at a time. At each gate she had to shed an article of clothing until she entered the underworld naked.

This spread encourages you to examine your inner desires and discover how you might fulfill your heart's wish.



The Nine of Wands represents passage via passion. The seven veils dance is done in order to obtain something, as Ishtar's passage does. The Nine of Wands is a formidable character who forges new ground as a result of bravery, strength, and being a breaker of barriers.

Imbolc Stirring Within You Spread

Today marks the ancient calendar date for Imbolc, a fire festival celebrating new life. The most ancient of Celtic pastoral holidays, Imbolc's literal translation is "in the belly," marking the first stirrings and flutterings of life in earth's soil after a long winter.

In Ireland, tradition states you should place a loaf of bread on the windowsill for Brigid and an ear of corn for the white cow with red ears who is her traveling companion.

Brigid (both Pagan deity and Catholic saint) is celebrated on this day. She is the spirit of healing, poetry, and music, and she is the patron of artists, poets, craftspeople, and livestock. This spread uses Brigid's fiery, regenerative qualities to inform questions of what stirs inside you.



The Queen of Wands shares a profound connection with Brigid. Brigid connects with fire, manifesting as a pillar of fire or with flames shooting from her head. This is an apt description of the Queen of Wands, who uses passion and power to help or hinder those around her.

Brigid's crosses woven from wheat protected the home from fire and lightning. Cast your cards in the shape of a Brigid's cross.

Fertility Spread

Today is Lupercalia, the most ancient of Roman fertility festivals. Roman god Lupercus's Greek equivalent is Pan. Goats and young dogs, revered for their strong sexual instincts, were sacrificed at a cave by the foot of Palatine, where the wolf Lupa gave birth to Romulus and Remus.

Acts of fertility magic included smearing the foreheads of two youths of noble birth with sacrificial blood. These Luperci ran naked except for the skins of sacrificial goats. They struck women with goatskin thongs. Women eagerly stood forward, as the Luperci touch was thought to make them fertile.


This spread looks at fertility for someone wishing to become pregnant. Keep in mind that tarot is never a substitute for examining medical issues with a professional. The cards can be used in holistic ways to provoke insight, ideas, and opinions.



The Queen of Pentacles, the homemaker and master of the material world, sits with a bunny at her feet. This bunny represents the fertility of all domestic things.

Saint Valentine, the namesake of Valentine's Day, was a third-

century Roman saint who is widely associated with the tradition of courtly love. Courtly love was a unique medieval concept of the noble, chivalrous expression of love and admiration. The world's greatest lover, Casanova, ate chocolate to keep him virile. More than 35 million heartshaped boxes of chocolate will be purchased this Valentine's Day.

Fallen hard for someone? Courtly love was practiced in secret among nobility. Exalting the female in the highest form of worship, it was generally not practiced between husband and wife. Merging eroticism with a spiritual quest, making romantic obsession like a god truly obtainable. and not it leaves unquenched desire in its wake. Sensual desire is explored in this spread, whose questions are based on the seven stages of courtly love, adapted from Barbara Tuchman.



The searing Ace of Wands contains intensity, attraction, spiritual fire, and love at first sight. Aces are like seeds containing minute qualities of each particular suit. You can see each ace bloom as you move through their numbers.

Savor the agony of passion and invoke pleasure while casting:

Problem-Solving Spread

Galileo Galilei—mathematician, philosopher, physicist, and the father of modern astronomy—was born in Pisa, Italy, on this day in 1564. Galileo led the Scientific Revolution by defending heliocentrism, stating the earth revolves around the sun.

At odds with the church's conviction of an earthcentered universe, Galileo was brought before the Inquisition, charged with heresy, and placed under house arrest in 1633, where he remained until his death.


The nature of Galileo's innate curiosity led to his many inventions and discoveries. Summoning Galileo for inspiration, this spread helps us think creatively to solve any issue we may be grappling with.



The Hierophant, like Galileo, shares knowledge. The Hierophant's purpose is purveying education, belief systems, studying, and learning. Originally named the Pope, the Hierophant connects to the rigidity of religion and belief systems—ironically, the very belief systems that imprisoned Galileo.

The answers and possibilities you seek are as infinite as the universe itself.

Pamela Colman Smith's Synesthesia Experiment Spread

Pamela Colman Smith was born this day in 1878. Smith paved the way for intuitive tarot reading when she illustrated the minor arcana for the first time since the fifteenth century's Sola Busca deck.

Synesthesia stems from the Greek words syn ("together") and aisthesis ("perception"). The word literally means "joined perception."

Smith had a high degree of synesthesia, a condition where one sense, like sight, is perceived with an additional sense, like hearing. For instance, hearing a Beethoven concerto, you also taste chocolate. Upon hearing the concerto, you would always experience the taste of chocolate. In fact, Smith created artwork by listening to Beethoven's Piano Sonata no. 11 and other pieces of music. This spread is an experiment to discover whether you have these qualities and explore your connection to your senses.



Synesthesia, common among artists, connects to the Empress card, who embodies the imagination. From the possible pregnancy she displays under her flowing garments to the number 3 signifying two forces combined to create a third, the Empress is the essence of creation.

Ask yourself each question; answer with a yes or a no. If the answer is yes, you have synesthesia. If the answer is no, take the question a bit further by answering the second question (in italics) in correlation with a flip of the card.

1. Do numbers or letters cause a color experience to me? *What color is the number 9?*



- 2. Do calendar days and months have a specific taste to me? *What does October taste like*?
- 3. Do sounds produce colors in my head? *What color is a honking car horn?*

Kindness Spread

Today is Random Act of Kindness Day. While it's not a national holiday, it is a day where people are encouraged to do something kind for a friend or a stranger.

Acts of kindness are medically proven to make us healthier. Emotional warmth produces the hormone oxytocin in the brain, which moves through the body and reduces blood pressure. Elevated levels of dopamine, often referred to as "helper's high," leave us feeling tingly and good.

Kindness is a virtue and a value in many cultures and religions. True and heartfelt kindness is worth exploring on a deep level. The Kindness Spread helps you to do this. Use it for inspiration to commit blatant random acts of kindness.



The Queen of Cups is the most empathetic personality in the deck. The deep oceans surrounding her refer to her deep reserves of altruism, empathy, and emotional support for others.

The Kindness Spread's cards are cast in the shape of a ladder reaching upwards. Upon reaching the top of the stairs, you will be ready to perform a random act of kindness.

Gertrude Moakley's Problem-Solving Spread

Gertrude Moakley was born this day in 1905. Moakley researched and wrote about Renaissance tarot while working as а librarian at the New York Public Library. She was the first scholar to suggest that tarot trumps are based on Renaissance parades, where each float "trumps" the next. The represented easily trumps understood allegories. These allegories were translated into a deck of cards as a playable game for both nobles and the general public.

Moakley suggests the female Pope (High Priestess) card is based on a distant relative of the Visconti family. Elected Popess by a small group of Guillemites, the Inquisition burned her at the stake in autumn of 1300.

Gertrude Moakley set out to solve tarot's biggest questions: where, how, and what is tarot? This spread uses the library detective for inspiration to help us resolve any issue or any problem.



The Justice card relates to problem-solving skills. Her upward-pointing sword seeks clarity, while the balancing scales represent the weighing of information. Notice she does not wear a blindfold, as she is keenly aware of the situation surrounding any issue.

The cards are cast in a straight line to ease your flow of information.




Nin was a friend—in some cases, lover—of many literary figures, including Henry Miller, John Steinbeck, and Gore Vidal.

Sybil Leek explained palmistry's connection with astrology. Beneath each finger and the thumb are fleshy mounds called mounts, each derived from an astrological connection, given names of the planets, and associated with planetary qualities. This spread's questions are inspired by the mounts.




Leek remarks, "The Tarot reader gives a performance that has elements of suspense as the client waits to know what the future holds. Personally, I know of no other form of divination which offers this Hitchock-like suspense... A candidate entering the Masonhood must state that they believe in a supreme being; however, the Masons do not insist on naming who the supreme being should be. Belief in a higher power, any power, is required upon entry.

Tracing boards, like tarot cards, are symbolic learning devices. Used by Masons to advance through their grades, different boards offer different lessons. The Seeking the Light Masonic Mystery Spread uses the first degree tracing board as inspiration.



The Three of Pentacles in the RWS deck contains Masonic symbolism: an apron, bench, and Masonic tool. Many Golden Dawn members were Masons, and they used Masonic structure in the Golden Dawn's own grading and initiations.



people and damaging buildings. Eventually deemed a false alarm, the press and media sensed a cover-up.



This decision will alter their lives forever. The Les Misérables Spread is based on themes found in the novel and musical adaptation.

The Haunted House Spread is useful to perform in a home or space with ghosts bumping about. Discover the story of a place as you learn how to clear the energy of a house, apartment, or dwelling. Perform this spread at your own risk. Once the information comes to light, there is no way to unlearn it.



The reversed Death card represents residual energy resulting in hauntings. Past energy that hasn't dissipated affects the present. It is by letting go that evolution is possible.

Moina Mathers was born on this day in 1865. Moina—artist, occultist, and the first member initiated into the Golden Dawn—was married to Golden Dawn founder Samuel Liddell MacGregor Mathers. Working closely with her husband, he as magician and she as oracle, they brought forth information for the order using Moina's clairvoyant skills.

Moina Mathers's brother was philosopher Henri Bergson, the first Jewish man to receive the Nobel Prize for Literature.

Clairvoyance is the ability to gain information through visualization or mental imagery. It means "one who sees clearly." The Clairvoyance Spread examines aspects of clairvoyance and suggests questions to activate your own clairvoyant qualities.



The Queen of Cups is a deeply clairvoyant woman. Her cups contains watery visions of truth and imagination. Truly metaphysical and artistic, she dreams for those who cannot.

On this night in 1504, Christopher Columbus tricked Jamaican natives into giving his sailors food, even after his sailors had stolen from the natives. He did so by correctly predicting a full lunar eclipse visible on this night. Using his almanac knowledge, Columbus pretended the eclipse was a sign from his god and used the trick to manipulate the natives.

Ancient Egyptian stories regaled lunar eclipses as a sow swallowing the moon. Mayans interpreted it as a jaguar swallowing the moon. Many cultures viewed lunar ellipses as demons swallowing the moon. They would chase the eclipse away by yelling and throwing stones at it.

Lunar eclipse magic is very potent. A lunar eclipse only happens during a full moon as the earth's shadow passes over the moon's face. Evoking the Triple Goddess, this spread's questions regard aspects of deep magic for clarity and wisdom in daily life.



The High Priestess and her triple crown—a reference to the waxing, full, and waning moon—is connected to the Maiden, Mother, and Crone Triple Goddess concept. A sliver of moon weaves through her luminescent robes.

The Lunar Eclipse Spread can be performed anytime but has extra strength on the night of an eclipse. Cast in the shape of a waxing moon, indicative of growing abundance.

Today was the due date for Truman Capote's manuscript *Answered Prayers*. The author of *In Cold Blood* and *Breakfast at Tiffany's* would have been paid one million dollars had it been delivered today in 1968. The manuscript was never submitted, and he was quoted as saying, "I'm either going to kill it or it's going to kill me." Capote died in 1984.

Psychologists distinguish between three types of procrastinators. This includes avoiders (people with strong fear of failure and success), thrill seekers (who enjoy a lastminute euphoric rush sensation), and decisional procrastinators (who can't make decisions).

Dr. Seuss was bet \$50 by a publisher that he couldn't write a book with fifty assorted words or less. The classic **Green Eggs and Ham** was the result.

Geisel based his famous Grinch from *The Grinch Who Stole Christmas* on himself. He found himself cranky and unexcited for the holidays and decided to write the Grinch to discover if he could find something about Christmas he'd obviously lost.



The Four of Pentacles is often considered the grinchiest card in the entire deck. Seen as a miser, he holds his pentacle tightly and defensively. But don't be so quick to judge—it can also be understood as the card of stability due to the solid nature of the number four.

Cast your cards in the shape of an umbrella so you can turn that frown upside down and let a smile be your umbrella.

The Shoshone Forest became the first nationally protected forest in the Unites States today in 1891. Covering over 2,500,000 acres in Wyoming, from craggy mountain peaks to dense spruce and fir forests, the abundant land is rich in biodiversity and home to over 335 animal species.

What you put out comes back threefold; the rule of three applies to more than just witchcraft. While hiking or camping, remember this: a person can go three minutes without air, three hours without heat, three days without water, and three weeks without food.

Cinderella's Jealousy Spread

The film *Cinderella* came out on this day in 1950. Cinderella suffers at the cold, cruel hands of her wicked stepmother and evil stepsisters until she reigns triumphant in the end. Envy and greed make Cinderella's life miserable until she marries her prince and moves to the castle.

Most Disney movies contain hidden Mickey Mouse images. Cinderella is no exception. Look closely when Cinderella sings "Sing, Sweet Nightingale"—three bubbles converge to form Mickey's face.

Jealousy is a familiar feeling that everyone deals with. This spread has been written for when you feel the pangs of envy. It looks closely at what elicits this response in you, what you can learn about yourself, and how you can let it go.



The reversed Queen of Wands represents a person burning up, sweating, and fuming with jealousy. If you discover a reversed card you don't like, simply turn it right-side up to release its negative hold on the situation.

Justice is one of the four cardinal virtues, along with Temperance, Fortitude (Strength), and Prudence. Females depicted these virtues in fifteenth and sixteenth century icons. Mysteriously, Prudence is absent from the tarot pack, though her sisters all make an appearance.

Using the highest US court as inspiration, this spread examines symbols found within the Justice card.



The Justice card expresses the need for balance and harmonizing conflicting needs through actions, thoughts, and words. Justice is highly aspected with work and serves as a reminder that we reap what we sow.

Pull the Justice card from your deck. Place it in the center of the Justice Card Spread and cast your shuffled cards around it as follows: 1. Double-edged sword: How can I see clearly?

Michelangelo claimed he only had to look inside the stone to discover the image he sought to create. While making David, he said he needed only to chip away at what was not the image to release the truth of his masterpiece.

Working creatively, you can invoke the spirit of Michelangelo the same way you might invoke a god for a magical ritual. Utilizing his genius for inspiration, this spread sheds light on your creative process.



Have you noticed that all the Aces contain a mysterious hand emerging from a cloud? Renaissance art often depicts the hand of God stretching from mysterious clouds.

The Odd Couple series was based on the play by Neil Simon of the same title.



Limiting Belief Spread

Today is Barbie's birthday. Mattel launched the miniature blond bombshell on this day in 1959. Barbie bore the brunt of controversy when criticized that she was an unrealistic role model for young girls. The power of Barbie prevails as she remains a popular doll and the figurehead of an empire.

Barbie's real name is Barbara Millicent Roberts. Boyfriend Ken was named after the son of Mattel founders Ruth and Elliot Handler.

Using unrealistic physical expectations of beauty as an example, this spread examines a lie that is told or believed as truth. Big growth moments occur when we realize that a truth we hold is false. This spread asks you to choose a limiting belief you believe is true. You will then pull cards to discover otherwise.

The East River between Manhattan and Queens froze over in 1888. The brave souls who crossed the river on foot were in for a rude awakening when the tides changed. The surface broke, leaving them stranded on ice floes.

Unforeseen surprises can pop up like unexpected storms. Temperatures the day before the blizzard of '88 hovered in the mid fifties until two fronts collided. The Nine of Pentacles is a gardener's dream landscape. The card bursts with bounty, animal and vegetable coexist, and the female on the card is content and secure, at home in the garden of herself.

Uranus is the coldest planet in our solar system with an average temperature of -350 degrees F. Its orbit lasts the equivalent of 84 Earth years, and it has 27 moons. Seasons on Uranus last more than twenty years because the planet is tilted on its side.


This spread contains questions based on the astrological associations of the planet Uranus. This general spread uses a heavenly body to offer you greater clarity in life.



Hoffman admits her childhood was not always a happy one. Speaking of the magic she discovered amidst the escapism of books, the young Hoffman was often found in the library.





Germanic tribes that honored Ostara, a lunar goddess, explain how she mates with her fertility god at this time of year. She gives birth nine months later during the Yule celebration.




This spread is based on the essential qualities of Aries, including being demanding, ambitious, and effective, as well as exhibiting courageousness, leadership, and determination.

You wouldn't want to be caught with a deck of tarot cards in the Massachusetts Bay Colony on this day in 1630. Town officials enacted a law banning possession of cards, dice, and gaming tables.

Older than any tarot deck, the Wheel of Fortune icon is displayed in medieval manuscripts and on church walls throughout Europe. The symbol endures because it serves as a reminder of the temporary nature of life.

Gambling often references the icon of the Wheel of Fortune. This spread is based on symbols found upon the Wheel of Fortune card and looks at where this lucky symbol could lead you.



The Wheel of Fortune portends the beginning of a new cycle, but unlike the Fool, who starts afresh, the Wheel makes use of past lessons learned. The Wheel also denotes changing fortunes, a rash of luck, and sometimes a windfall of cash.Fortune spins her wheel, and the fates of those attached rise and fall at her whim.




Philosophy is the study of knowledge, reality, and the nature of existence. The High Priestess's reality is entirely based in her inner realm of knowing and understanding.

He also dictated the spiritual text of Islam, the Koran, to Mohammed. Hmmm, sounds a touch like fortunetelling and mediumship, doesn't it?

Unresolved conflict leads to resentment, which causes negative impacts on health and longevity. Resolve conflicts now to avoid future negativity.

Feeling a Mercury retrograde? Suffering through a misunderstanding? The patron saint of communications and messengers, Gabriel inspires questions posed to ease communications between people, coworkers, colleagues, friends, loved ones, or family members when conflicts arise.

The Titans were a primeval race of powerful deities who ruled during the Golden Age. They were overthrown by the Olympians, a race of younger gods, during the War of the Titans.



The Fool can be seen as the soul embarking on the Hero's Journey. Moving through the cards with a nose for adventure and a knack for all things supernatural, he learns lessons, transforming into a hero.



Immensely popular among Chinese Buddhists, she is seen as a source of unconditional love, a savior, and a protector of women and children.

Kuan Yin is associated with vegetarianism due to her empathetic state. Chinese vegetarian restaurants are often decorated with her image, and she appears in many Buddhist vegetarian pamphlets and magazines.


Reflecting upon the nature of compassion, Kuan Yin is perfect inspiration for this spread. The deity inspires questions posed to open your heart and soul.

To have a mercurial nature means displaying qualities of eloquence, shrewdness, and swiftness. It also means having a quick, changeable, sometimes volatile personality.





Today is April Fool's Day, twenty-four hours of light-hearted pranks and jokes. No resource explains how or why the practical jokes began, but it is likely connected to the oldest fertility rites of spring, when the sun's return echoed the continuance of human life.

In the ruling days of monarchy, fools or court jesters were often the only members of the court with the freedom to do or say anything they pleased. While fools and simpletons act outside the bounds of normalcy, this ultimate outsider status actually brought them freedom.

Today was made for the Fool card, on whom this spread is based. The questions are based on symbolism found within the Fool card.



The Fool represents a fresh start and a new beginning. Because he harbors no fear, the Fool represents freedom. If you follow the Fool's path, new possibilities evolve and your landscape will inevitably change.

Hans Christian Andersen had a habit of falling in love with unattainable women. Upon his death, a small pouch was found on his chest. The pouch contained a letter from his first unrequited love of many decades earlier.

Did you know your life is a fairy tale? All fairy tales contain common themes and motifs. These essential components can be found in your life and are activated by this spread.



The magic found in fairy tales also thrives in the suit of Wands. In addition to representing fire and passion, they are actual magical wands reverberating with power and the ability to achieve anything the bearer sets their mind to.

Cards, throwing dice, gambling, luck, and fortunetelling have always been intertwined. Dice can be thrown for divination too. Sybil Leek explains in her book *On Fortune Telling* how dice are tossed into a 360-degree circle. The circle is divided into twelve 30-degree sections. The information in each sector is based on the number reflected in the dice. This spread is based on Sybil's method, using tarot cards instead of dice.



The Wheel of Fortune card reflects life's ups and downs and is likely the only tarot motif on plenty of slot machines.

Thousands of New York fans waved goodbye. In Monaco, over 20,000 onlookers lined the streets to greet their future princess.

About 62 percent of people still live in the state where they were born. Florida has the lowest percentage of people born there who still live there.

While the fanfare of Grace Kelly's move was extraordinary, making the personal decision to move can be challenging. One of the most important decisions you will ever make, this spread is designed to help you find the living situation of your dreams.



The Eight of Cups and Six of Swords are both "moving" cards. Each card suggests better times lie ahead. The Eight of Cups signifies a move alone; the Six of Swords, a move with others.





The social movement of temperance was the force leading to Prohibition. The temperance movement promoted complete abstinence from drinking. It holds little in common with the concept of balance and what the Temperance card actually refers to.

The Salem witch hysteria began with a group of young girls playing fortunetelling games, which were forbidden by rigid Puritan dogma.



Nothing is more destructive than a mind set on bloodlust and violence, and the extreme qualities of any suit can be deadly. 



Aleister Crowley signed his lease for the Abbey of Thelema in Sicily on this day in 1920. Sex magic, yoga, ritual practices, and the pursuit of free will and pleasure ran wild at Crowley's utopic commune.

Tragedy struck when a 23year-old Oxford graduate perished at the Abbey. His death was blamed on participation in a Crowley ritual. Mussolini promptly ejected Crowley from Sicily in 1923, though the crumbling structure still stands to this day.

Have doubts about your relationship? Objectivity can be tough when viewing a relationship from the inside. The salacious activity taking place inside Crowley's commune had members reevaluating their situation from time to time. This spread poses questions to check on the status of your relationship. Mainly written as a romantic relationship spread, you could also use this to examine a close friendship.

On this day in 1452, a peasant woman gave birth to an out-of-wedlock son who grew up to embody the Renaissance humanist ideal. A sculptor, inventor, mathematician, architect, botanist, musician, anatomist, writer, and one of the most famous painters of all time, her little bundle of joy was Leonardo da Vinci.

Leonardo stole corpses from graveyards to study human anatomy. A compulsive draftsman, he filled scraps of paper with sketches, doodles, and drawings, about 4,000 of which survive to this day.

Seeking solutions? All geniuses have something in common that sets them on a path to greatness: they ask questions. This spread reminds us that when searching for answers to a problem—be it healing, painting, or inventing—your final answer lies in a leap of awareness that only creative thinking will bring. Use this spread to jumpstart the creative process for any project, idea, or problem.



Those with a strong affinity to da Vinci's work will find the Leonardo da Vinci Tarot by Iassen Ghiuselev and Atanas Atanassov of great interest.

Castle of Crossed Destinies' Inversion Spread

The Castle of Crossed Destinies by Italo Calvino is published on this day in 1979. The characters in Calvino's story have lost their power of speech due to traumatic events. Each character relates their tale using tarot cards instead of words. A narrator interprets the cards for them, but because the cards are open to interpretation, the story the narrator relates is not necessarily the story intended by the characters.

The Castle of Crossed Destinies is divided into two sections. The first takes place in a castle and uses the the Visconti-Sforza Tarot. The second, taking place in a tavern, uses the Marseilles Tarot.

Ever notice how the same life event can be interpreted in different ways? Accessing the power of storytelling, this spread asks you to pull specific cards rather than randomly drawn cards to tell a story from your life.



The entire major arcana can be read as the storytelling arc of initiation and is symbolic of the Hero's Journey.

Use tarot to tell a tale. Think of a dramatic or poignant part of your life open for exploration. Select cards to represent the story and people. Add as many cards as needed for important details. After completing, ask a friend to interpret the story based on your cards, with no information from you. How close or far do they come to the truth? Do you discover something new in their rendition?

Morgan was a passionate collector of antiquities. Tarot was one of his prized possessions. He owned one-third of the original Visconti-Sforza deck; it sat near his desk in his private study until he died.

Could your financial philosophy use a boost? Using this giant of banking, we can take a look at our own financial habits through the lens of tarot.



The Ten of Pentacles may be the wealthiest card in the deck, but the jam-packed card begs the question of where one's attention goes once the material world has been conquered.

Summon the financial wisdom of J. P. Morgan and cast your cards.

More than 3,300 people auditioned for the original **Beauty and the Beast** Broadway show, but only 30 were cast.

Can tarot make you more beautiful? Inner beauty reflects the nature of the soul. It has nothing to do with external appearance. This spread is created to cultivate and explore elements of your own inner beauty.



The Nine of Pentacles portrays a woman completely secure, surrounded by animal friends, and lacking nothing. Satisfied with her own company, she is quite content to turn her attention only to what fascinates her. She also represents achieving a comfortable lifestyle and is tactful and diplomatic.

Cast your cards like a mirror reflecting your soul rather than your lovely looks.

Primroses have long been considered a literary flower. Katniss's little sister in the Hunger Games series is named for the flower, Shakespeare refers to its cosmetic properties in A Midsummer Night's Dream, and poet John Donne connects the primrose with womanhood.





Some ancient Romans placed the symbol of a phallus on their front door as a symbol of fertility and luck. Miniature phalluses were often worn as lucky charms.




Looking for inspiration from the garden bed? This spread uses goddess Flora's spring flowers and their Victorian meanings to inform its questions.





Antoine Court de Gébelin passed away on this day in 1784. He is important to tarot's history because all of tarot's occult associations began with him. He was the first person in recorded history to claim that tarot is a repository of ancient secrets.

Court de Gébelin and Benjamin Franklin were Masonic brothers in the Les Neuf Seurs lodge and served as Voltaire's conductors in his Masonic initiation.

Is something hiding from you in plain sight? Truth and wisdom can be directly in front of us, yet we don't see them till we are ready. De Gébelin explained to all of Paris society that tarot was the Egyptian Book of Thoth an ancient book of secrets hidden in plain sight. His Egyptian theory was eventually disproved, yet his influence is undeniable.



The King of Swords, like Court de Gébelin, is a well-educated scholar who has the capacity of reaching a large audience due to his seat of power.

Artist Frieda Harris passed away on this day in 1962. Harris collaborated with Aleister Crowley, and she painted the Thoth tarot deck.

Although Harris took notes from Crowley for the Thoth deck, he offered her full credit. He said it was Harris who kept the deck's momentum afloat. She insisted he consider each and every card as a masterpiece, able to stand on its own, independent from the rest of the deck.


Did you know an artist's paintbox can offer clues to your personality? Frieda Harris used watercolors to paint the Thoth deck. Using her palette as inspiration, this spread is based on the magical significance of color.



The Empress card, ruled by Venus, is the embodiment of creativity. Symbolized by wheat, pomegranates, and pregnancy, her fertility is not only literal but also figurative. She represents ideas and talent springing forth.

The first Mother's Day was celebrated today in 1907. Anna Jarvis campaigned for a Mother's Day holiday in memory of her deceased mother. The elder Jarvis had created Mothers' Day Work Clubs to improve sanitary and health conditions in burgeoning cities around the United States.

Mothers in the 1700s gave birth to an average of 7 to 10 children; in the 1950s, they averaged 3.5 children; and today's moms average 2 children. A mother changes 7,300 diapers by the time her baby turns two, and no mother could ever be described as average.

The mother-child relationship is evident for everyone regardless of form. The Mother's Day spread examines this delicate relationship in order to better understand it. Doing so, you come a step closer to understanding yourself.



The Empress represents the archetypal Mother figure, while the queens represent mothers you'd meet on a day-to-day basis. The Queen of Pentacles represents a chef, decorator, gardener, and crafter type of homemaker.

Other family members banged pots and pans to rid the home from the wandering, restless spirits.

The US yearly average of requests for exorcism comes in at about 400, but only two or three are usually approved by the church. Pope John Paul the Second carried out an unsuccessful exorcism in 2000. It took many more sessions from another priest to "cleanse" the victim.



The philanthropic Rockefeller Foundation was created on this day in 1913. From establishing institutions like the Johns Hopkins School of Health and the American Shakespeare Festival to funding initiatives, fellowships, and scholarships, the foundation is responsible for a dizzying array of philanthropy. Rockefeller himself has been called the greatest philanthropist in American history.

John D. Rockefeller abstained from alcohol and tobacco all his life. Saving most of his income, he spent it on philanthropy, revolutionizing its modern concept. He thanked his mother for his philosophy, as it was she who taught him "willful waste makes woeful want."

Looking to balance your checkbook? Rockefeller became the richest man in the world before becoming its greatest philanthropist. His financial books were balanced. Using his inspiration, this spread examines money and balancing your budget.




Academy Awards Spread

Tickets to the first Oscar event cost \$5; 270 people attended, and the ceremony lasted only 15 minutes.



Pendulum Spread

Edgar Allen Poe published *The Pit and the Pendulum* on this day in 1845. Poe's gothic story of torture at the hands of the Spanish Inquisition appeared in *The Broadway Journal*.

Golden Dawn member William Butler Yeats was a critic of Poe, finding his work vulgar. Yeats said **The Pit and the Pendulum** "does not seem to me to have any permanent literary value of any kind...analyze [it] and you find an appeal to the nerves by tawdry physical affrightments."

You can use a pendulum for a unique one-card tarot reading. A pendulum is a weight suspended by a freely moving pivot. Purchase one or easily make one by slipping a ring over a necklace chain to create a makeshift pendulum.



The razor-sharp Ace of Swords represents the genesis of a genius idea. Reversed or swung outward, the Ace of Swords becomes a deadly weapon, ready to slice its foes to shreds. It reflects the potential of any person to be brilliant or destructive, and if it appears for you, you should follow through on your most recent good idea.

The Empress marks the female counterpart to the High Priestess. While the High Priestess contains knowledge, it is the Empress who uses and expresses knowledge. Their duality creates the ultimate female archetype.

Eleanor of Aquitaine provides inspiration with which to view the symbols found on the Empress card. These symbols and associations inspire the Empress spread.



The Empress is complete intelligence expressing itself in every creative aspect. The epitome and essence of femininity, she is the Mother archetype who not only creates life but sustains it.

Use this spread to answer any question. Format your question before casting the spread or simply let the cards answer the questions posed. Pull the Empress card from your deck. Placing her in the center, cast your cards around her.



Bram Stoker published *Dracula* on this day in 1897. In doing so, he defined the modern form of vampires as we know them today.

Feeling a touch of bloodlust? *Dracula*'s bloody tale regales the count's attempt to relocate from Transylvania to England and the ensuing battle between perceived forces of good and evil. Stoker invoked themes of Victorian female sexuality, immigration, and post-colonialism. The Dracula Spread uses themes from the iconic novel to inform its questions.



Artist and author Robert Place created the Vampire Tarot, based upon the novel *Dracula*. He posits that the vampire's thirst for blood is a metaphor for the Holy Grail quest—the life-giving substance and fountain of youth for which all philosophers and alchemists strive.


Marie Anne Lenormand's Palm Reading Spread

In 1807 Lenormand read Napoleon's palm and predicted his intention to divorce Josephine. He imprisoned Lenormand for twelve days in December while he finalized his divorce. This incident propelled her into notoriety, making her the most sought-after reader of her time.

All tarot aces connect to the palm. Note the hand on each ace where the symbol of each suit rests. All aces are connected to the number 1 and represent the beginning of a cycle, issue, or chapter in your life.




Amnesty International was awarded the Nobel Peace Prize in 1977 for securing peace, justice, and security in the world.



Pope Benedict recently asked Spanish priests to distance themselves from El Colacho to downplay this Pagan tradition's connection with Catholicism.



Yoga Asana Archetype Spread

On this day in 1893, Swami Vivananda began his journey to America from India. Speaking at the Chicago World's Fair, this was the first time yoga was introduced to America on a large scale.

The om mantra is found in Hindu and Tibetan philosophy. It is said to be the primordial sound of the universe and is connected to the third eye (consciousness) chakra.

This spread's questions are based on basic yoga poses to explore the meaning and metaphor behind them. This spread is helpful whether you are familiar with the practice or not. If you do keep a personal yoga practice, you might want to ponder these questions when performing these asanas, or positions.



Like a yogi, the Hanged Man's inversion places him upside down, looking at the world from a new perspective. The Hanged Man is associated with artists, seers, and mystics. He represents arriving at a crossroads and sometimes signals a pause leading to wisdom and prophetic power.

The cards of this spread are cast in the shape of Downward-Facing Dog, an all-around rejuvenating stretch.

- 2. Tree Pose: Why is it important to be strong yet flexible?
- 3. Headstand: What helps me to see the world from a different perspective?
- 4. Eagle: Can I see what is truly important in life?

- 7. Corpse Pose: How can I let go of everything?

Find True North Spread

Magnetic north was discovered on this day in 1831. Two norths lie in the Arctic: magnetic north varies from place to place due to magnetic abnormalities, while true north is the northernmost point on Earth's surface. True north sits at the top of Earth's axis, the point upon which it spins. Magne tic north moves, while true north is fixed.

Standing at the North Pole, all directions point south. The North Pole is actually located in the Arctic Ocean, covered by sea ice that constantly moves amidst the icy waters.



Circus Spread

Legendary huckster P. T. Barnum began touring with his circus on this day in 1871, calling it P. T. Barnum's Grand Traveling Museum, Menagerie, Caravan, and Hippodrome.

P. T. Barnum was over sixty years old when he entered the circus business. He was also an author, publisher, philanthropist, and even a politician. He served in the Connecticut legislature and was mayor of Bridgeport, CT, for one year.

Does the big tent and roar of the crowd fill you with childlike wonder and delight? This spread uses classic circus elements to inform a general spread about your life.



The Two of Pentacles looks like a juggler or circus performer as he balances two Pentacles. The card speaks of balance and the need to eventually make a decision. It is important to remain flexible regardless of the outcome.

Cast your cards like a three-ring circus.

mythology still allowed the female component in warfare.

The Queen of Wands acts as goddess of war when scorned. Wands, the suit of Fire, renders her dangerous, volatile, and explosive. One need only ponder this decisive and destructive element to understand just how hot under the collar this queen is likely to become when crossed.



Citing a headache as a reason not to have sex won't work anymore. Scientists have discovered the endorphins released during sex naturally reduce the pain of a headache.

Need to spice it up? Dr. Ruth has helped the masses improve their sex lives. Channeling Dr. Ruth's openness and sage advice, this spread looks at how to improve the quality of your sex life.



Note the phallic and explosive nature of the Tower card. It represents the ultimate male orgasm. The watery Star card follows the Tower and represents the ultimate female orgasm and receptiveness.

Because Venus is visible to the naked eye, it is present in many mythologies, including written accounts of the ancient Babylonians. Venus is named after the Roman goddess of love and beauty.

Venus rules Taurus and Libra. One day on slowly rotating Venus lasts 243 Earth days, while the average surface temperature is 867 degrees F. No wonder Venus represents the slow burn of passion, beauty, and love.

The Qualities of Venus Spread contains questions based on astrological associations of the planet Venus. Using these associations, questions are posed to offer greater clarity in life.



Venus's aspects emerge through the Empress card as a reminder to focus attention on passions, loves, and what brings pleasure. The symbol of Venus is placed on the heartshaped shield at her feet.



A priesthood of women, the vestal virgins were Rome's only full-time group of female priests. The vestals were considered essential to the continuance and security of Rome, caring for a sacred fire that was never allowed to go out.


Ready for a bit of housekeeping? Vesta's Happy Home Spread calls to Vesta for inspiration on the cultivation and maintenance of a happy home.

Crowley had been looking for an artist for a tarot project and had his friend Clifford Bax help him find one. When the artist he'd planned to introduce to Crowley didn't materialize, he invited Harris instead. The rest is tarot history.

This spread considers the theme of partnership and how you can work best with the other person or entity. It can be read for romantic, business, or platonic partnerships.



Two of Cups is the partnership card, representing romantic, platonic, or business partnerships. Balance and harmony manifest as a result. The caduceus of Hermes represents the healing element present in the relationship.

The average employee spends over 90,000 hours on the job in their lifetime.


Feeling unsatisfied at work? The questions examine the reasons why. Once the problem is defined, a solution will present itself.

the horse inside the gates. Under the darkness of night, the Greeks crept out of the horse, opened the gates, sacked Troy, and ended the war.



The Magician's iconography in historical tarot depicts him as swindler or slight-of-hand artist. Not until the formation of esoteric decks did occultists get hold of the Magician and elevate him to the level of magus.

The Magician Card Spread is based on symbols found on the Magician tarot card. It probes your connection to matters of personal power.



The Magician represents pure will; he is able to cast magic as he pleases. He represents the ability to make something happen—a reminder of inner strength, resolve, mastery, and charisma.

Use this spread to answer any question. Format your question before casting the spread or simply let the cards answer the questions posed. Pull the Magician card from your deck. Placing it in the center of the Magician Card Spread, cast your cards around it as follows: 1. Magic Wand: Where do I receive power?


Papus was only 24 years old when he wrote his complicated treatise Tarot of the Gypsies: The Most Ancient Book in the World, otherwise known as Tarot of the Bohemians.

Papus's Tarot Discovery Spread was created to examine a personal journey with the cards. A tarot practice takes many forms; this spread inquires about your path.



The Eight of Cups connects to all journeys, tarot or otherwise. The figure moving up the mountain is the Hermit, who sets off on his journey to enlightenment. Leaving all worldly possessions behind him as he goes, this is a metaphor for abandoning what you have gained in search for something more.

Six Realms of Existence Spread

Tibet celebrates a three-day festival today at the Tashilhunpo Monastery, a massive monastery founded by the first Dalai Lama. It is marked with the hanging of a giant *thangka*, a painting on silk or cloth with embroidery.

The key to entering and exiting spiritual realms is to understand that they are actually empty. They exist as products of the human mind; this is why death is instant spiritual liberation. This also teaches us how to live within the constant flow of life and death.

The Tibetan Book of the Dead is a funerary text describing the levels of consciousness between a soul's death and next rebirth. This spread is inspired by each realm of consciousness.





The six realms are depicted as segments on the Wheel of Life, corresponding to the Wheel of Fortune card.

Cast your cards and proceed into the Tibetan land of the dead.

- 2. Realm of Hungry Ghosts (greed): What do I crave?
- 3. The Animal Realm (dullness): What bores me?

Spiritualism Spread

The Spiritualist Church selected a grove in upstate New York on this day in 1873 that would eventually become the Lily Dale Assembly, a town of spiritualists and mediums. The year-round population hovers near 275 residents, but an average of 22,000 people come each year to attend workshops, lectures, and have private readings. An early believer of Spiritualism included Arthur Conan Doyle, author of the Sherlock Holmes mysteries.

Early séances were theatrical, dramatically conjuring and materializing spirits. Today's séances are concerned with mental mediumship, though messages received remain profound and insightful. Modern Spiritualism is similar to any other religion in its rituals and services.

Would you like to speak with the dead? Spiritualism, a religious movement that began in the nineteenth century, acknowledges life after death via contact with the spirit world. Male and female reverends are certified mediums, and séances are often conducted after church services. This spread is based on the general information that comes through a medium.



The Page of Cups is the medium, psychic, and intuitive card. Her great sensitivity is a reminder of the open nature of children and why children are often the first members of a household to sense ghosts and spirits. The fish popping out of her cup represents a vision or psychic flash.

Cast your cards in a razor-sharp line.

Summer Lovin' Spread

The rollicking stage musical *Grease* was turned into a film and premiered in New York City on this day in 1978.

Some psychologists say people fall in love with a person similar to a parent when there are unresolved childhood issues. Unaware, people seek to resolve this childhood conflict as an adult.

Are you ready for a summer love? Characters Sandy and Danny fall for each other over summer vacation. One of the film's memorable scenes and songs is *"Summer Nights,"* upon which this spread is based.



The Six of Wands is the triumphant celebration of victory, describing the emotional high of falling in love. Wands represent the fire, passion, and excitement of new love, and parades are often held during the warm days of summer.

Cast the cards of the Summer Lovin' Spread when the air turns warm and evenings are optimal for long walks on the beach. Feel the wind touch your skin, tuck your toes into the sand, and cast as follows: 1. Card symbolizing my summer fling.

Stravinsky was romantically linked with Coco Chanel. He ruthlessly promoted his work in order to support a lavish lifestyle that included living in Switzerland, Paris, the South of France, Hollywood, and New York City.

Are you ready to move out of your comfort zone? Great artists remind us of what is possible in both life and art. This spread uses Stravinsky as inspiration for questions regarding the pushing of your boundaries in work, relationships, and life, so your end result is evolution and growth.



The Five of Wands pushes boundaries. The energy and excitement created by the five sparring youths is indicative of the energetic blast needed to take on new challenges. They joust and spar in good fun, serving as a reminder of the joy occurring when one expands one's comfort zone.


This spread takes inspiration from aspects of the time-honored pastime of picnicking.

The first celebration of Father's Day took place on this day in 1910. Upon hearing of the newly created Mother's Day, Sonora Dodd—of Spokane, Washington—felt fathers were due their own day of recognition. Wanting to honor her widowed

father, who took care of his six children during the Civil War, she lobbied for a Father's Day.

Russian witchcraft states the most powerful botanicals are ritually harvested on Midsummer's Eve. Unique plants like the fern seed offer invisibility on this night only. Now is a magical time for divining, finding true love, and flirting.


This spread is based on the seven sacred directions. It is a powerful meditative opportunity for reflection during the excitement of midsummer's magic, manifestation, and abundance.



Henry VIII married six times, beheading two of his wives. Catherine Howard was only eighteen years old when Henry sent her to the guillotine.





This is an excellent card for someone in the creative arts.

Symbols communicate directly to our unconscious. Deep thoughts and beliefs about human life are conveyed in a single, immediate, and powerful image.



Kissing of all forms, vampire or otherwise, stems from the suit of Wands, representing passion and primal instincts. Wands are the fire of life throbbing within you, the blood in your veins making your skin warm and cheeks blush.

Cast your cards on a moonless night as you dwell amidst the shadows. Are you feeling brave enough to greet dark desires and discover who or what is waiting for you?

Beatie, a female-to-male transsexual, was legally recognized as a man when he married his wife, Nancy, who could not conceive. Thomas used artificial insemination to become pregnant and ultimately gave birth to three children.

The Beatie family filed for divorce, and a legal mess ensued. It challenged the validity of the marriage and raised issues of reproductive rights and abilities for a transgendered person to legally maintain his or her legal identity.

Gender issues may be deeper in our consciousness than we realize. This spread provokes deep, thoughtful questions about what it means to be male and female. These questions also will aid in understanding masculine (swords and wands) and feminine (cups and pentacles) suits of tarot.



The World card is seen by many cartomancers and occultists as a hermaphrodite, a figure equally male and female, representing the reconciliation of opposites and the experience of union.


The moon's effect is a subtle yet vital pull on the forces of life. The Full Moon Spread takes into account the intrinsic qualities of the moon to craft its questions.

Epic storms can rage on Saturn for months, even years. Saturn rules the astrological sign of Capricorn, and Saturday is named after Saturn.



What is your financial philosophy? The Savings Spread examines your conceptions of finance—how and why you save.



To perform this spread, you must pick something you want or need to get rid of. Once you have selected what you are letting go of, this spread marks the beginning of your independence.



The Eight of Wands represents energetic movement. Changes like gaining independence will alter the course of this energy, sending it to new and exciting places.

This spread takes on the shape of a firework, with the ninth card exploding in the center.

Isaac Newton's principle and recipe for the philosopher's stone—the substance that could turn base metals like iron, tin, and lead into gold—was accidentally discovered amidst a collection of old chemistry books at the Chemical Heritage Foundation in 2010.

Use alchemy to inform your life. The oldest branches of alchemy concerned themselves with creating an earthly paradise. Merging the cosmic and terrestrial, alchemy created a correspondence between planetary influences and the spirits of Earth's metals. This spread is based on the seven planetary metals found on Earth.



The number 7 has esoteric and occult significance relating to all sevens in tarot, including the Chariot. Secret and mysterious, there are 7 days of the week, 7 visible planets, and 7 notes on the musical scale; lucky sevens mark a fortunate gambler.

Cast the cards in the circular shape of our solar system.

Today is International Kissing Day, recognized in Great Britain, the United States, and Canada.

Why is kissing so much fun? Our lips are packed with sensitive nerve endings. The slightest brush triggers a cascade of neural messages to our brains and bodies. Lips are our most exposed erogenous zone.

Pucker up! Kisses convey messages and intimacy. Whether lip-locking a lover, pecking a child good night, or smooching a friend on the cheek, kisses convey love and affection. The Hold Me, Thrill Me, Kiss Me, Kill Me Spread uses kissing clichés to discern salacious information about life and love.



The Lovers card represents kissing and implicit sensuality. The Golden Dawn assigned an attribute to each major arcana card. The Lovers card was assigned smell, and rightly so. Kissing engages most of our senses, tastes, textures, secrets, and emotions. Through scent we instinctually examine the pheromones of our lover.

Lick those sexy lips and cast your cards.



Project Blue Book was the name of the Air Force's official investigation of UFO phenomena. The term was coined by Captain Edward J. Ruppelt.

The UFO Spread asks the tarot questions we all want to know regarding the existence of flying saucers.



Four Chambers of the Heart Spread

Physician Daniel Hale Williams performed the first successful human open-heart surgery on James Cornish today in 1893—without anesthesia. Ouch.

The heart can always be opened to receive and give more love. Never forget: the Law of Attraction states we receive what we give.

Give yourself over to your most valuable organ. The Four Chambers of the Heart Spread is based on the four chambers of your precious heart. Two of the heart's chambers are the superior atria, which are receiving chambers, connecting to the suits of Cups (Water) and Pentacles (Earth)—the feminine, soft, and receptive suits. The heart's other two chambers are the inferior ventricles, which are discharging chambers, connecting to the suits of Swords (Air) and Wands (Fire) —the masculine, hard, and domineering suits.



The Three of Swords is usually considered a heartbreak card due to the Rider-Waite and Sola Busca image. Add a new and slightly different understanding of the Three of Swords: recall that the threes in tarot imply creativity, and Swords represent the mind. The Three of Swords may be understood as extreme creativity of the mind.



Receiving and Accepting

Lady Godiva Spread

Lady Godiva rode her horse naked though the streets of Coventry, England, today in 1040. She did so to lower the tax burden her husband had unfairly placed upon its residents.

Out of respect for Lady Godiva, all residents remained inside, barring their windows and doors during the duration of her ride. One man named Tom peeked out a window. Before he saw anything, he was struck blind. The phrase "peeping Tom" stems from this story.


Are you ready to be brazen? Lady Godiva's legend, extremely sensual in nature, is symbolic of having the nerve and daring to do the right thing even if it means moving out of your comfort zone. The Lady Godiva Spread asks if there isn't someone or something in your life who could use a little help.



The Knight of Cups represents Lady Godiva's famous slow ride. The suit of Cups is female in nature, representing the imagination springing around her myth. A system of over 3,800 coral reefs and islands along the coast of Australia and the largest living thing on earth, it supports a wide variety of life including fish, whales, dolphins, and sea turtles.

The Europeans were slow to discover the Great Barrier Reef, while Australian Aboriginals have been aware of the reef for over 40,000 years.

Do you protect yourself well? The Great Barrier Reef, which can be seen from outer space, is inspiration for a spread concerning the boundaries you set to secure your mental and physical state.



The Ace of Swords is always at your beck and call to draw a line in the sand, in the air, or even in the soft flesh of your adversary. Slay all barriers with it. Standing for a great idea, this sword is your most powerful ally when you wield it fearlessly.

Remember how precious you are as you cast your cards.

Henry David Thoreau was born on this day in 1817. Poet, philosopher, and author of *Walden; or, Life in the Woods*, Thoreau was a leading Transcendentalist.

Transcendental meditation is a form of mantra meditation introduced to the United States by Maharishi Mahesh Yogi in the 1960s. This form of meditation is not connected to the Transcendentalist movement, but both are meant to move a person beyond the limits of themselves.

Are you ready to embrace the sublime? Transcendentalism is a philosophical movement. It places importance on the purity of the individual and nature, outside of organized religion. It claims people are at their best when they are truly self-reliant and independent rather than following pre-set, predetermined dogma. This spread is inspired by the ideas of leading Transcendentalists.



The Hanged Man connects to all forms of transcendence. He is willing to sacrifice creature comforts, look at the world through a new perspective, and perform the ultimate surrender of moving beyond one's physical limits.

The Transcendental Spread's cards are cast moving upward, as its title suggests.


Storming the Bastille was a symbolic act, as it only held seven prisoners the day it was taken. Four of the prisoners being held were there for check forging.

Graves theorized there was an archetypal triad of goddesses found in the mythology of Europe and the ancient Middle East. This spread uses the gentle beauty of Robert Grave's legacy and the Triple Goddess to inform its questions.



The Triple Goddess symbol, also a symbol of Wicca, rests on the crown of the High Priestess. The symbol emulates the simultaneous waxing, full, and waning moon, and, therefore, the Triple Goddess.



A. E. Waite's Boaz & Jachin Spread

Arthur Edward Waite, mystic, occultist, and writer, was born today in 1857. Waite, in collaboration with Pamela Colman Smith, is responsible for the most widespread deck of tarot cards ever created, the Rider-Waite tarot, sometimes called the Waite-Smith or Rider-Waite-Smith (RWS) deck.


The Rider-Waite-Smith deck was the first deck to be produced commercially in Britain. To this date it remains the world's best-selling tarot deck, setting the standard for the myriad decks to come.

Waite and illustrator Pamela Colman Smith placed the symbols of Boaz and Jachin on the High Priestess card. The letters B and J stand for Boaz and Jachin, legendary pillars in King Solomon's temple. These letters have always been used to illustrate the magical concept of polarity.



The Kabbalistic Tree of Life rests on three pillars. The High Priestess figure can be understood as the middle pillar. The middle pillar represents the integration of the left and the right. The Hierophant and Justice figures also sit between two Kabalistic pillars, thus connecting tarot to the pillars of the Tree of Life.

Cast in a set of pillars:

Paul Foster Case's Mystery School Spread

Paul Foster Case, occultist and author, was born on this day in 1884. Case created a modern mystery school, Builders of the Adytum (B.O.T.A.), which is still in existence to this day, offering mail-order tarot correspondence courses.

Greek and Roman Mysteries were recognized public institutions in the ancient world. The two most important Western mystery schools were Dionysian, the worship of food and wine, and Eleusinian, celebrating Demeter and her daughter Persephone.


Are you ready for transformation? Mystery schools exist to provide knowledge of the nonmaterial realms. Knowledge is gained through grades, initiations, and rituals. Their symbolic structure codifies principles as well as communicates them. The lessons must be experienced in order to be understood. Mystery schools bring initiates into hidden worlds that, like dreams, can only be experienced.



All ancient mysteries were presided over by a hierophant, an ancient Greek priest, thus connecting it to this tarot card. The Hierophant is the interpreter of sacred mysteries and arcane principles as well as the expounder of rites of worship and sacrifice.

The Mystery School Spread's cards are cast in a circle, 1 symbol of wholeness, unity, and infinity: 1. How can I transform my consciousness? 2. What specific action can I take to awaken energy in my body? 3. What dormant ability lies within me? 4. What experience do I need to have? 5. What knowledge waits for me?

6. How does my experience of life change as a result?

Gravitation Spread

The first Earth satellite was launched into space on this day by the Soviet Union in 1957. It circled Earth every 95 minutes at almost 2,000 miles per hour, eventually falling to back to Earth three months later.

Jupiter has the heaviest gravitational pull of all the planets. A 150-pound person would weigh more than 354 pounds walking across Jupiter, while if that same person skipped across Pluto, they would weigh no more than 10 pounds.

What are you drawn to? Like a satellite, you are held by the gravitational pull of certain themes repeating in your life. These themes may not be apparent early in life. Growing older, it is possible to retroactively connect the dots to see the themes emerge.



The World card represents rotation, gravitation, and manifestation. It reminds us to pay attention to what captivates us in order to live in freedom.


Meyer began writing the first draft of **Twilight** upon waking from a dream of a beautiful girl and a sparkling boy lying in a meadow of flowers.

Her mother, Demeter, refused to allow anything to grow, causing winter. Persephone was eventually released from the underworld, but not before Hades had deceived her into eating four pomegranate

As goddess of the underworld, Persephone speaks with ghosts and enjoys powers of necromancy. Her return to the upperworld signifies the beginning of spring.

seeds (in some versions she willingly ate them), which ensured her return to the underworld for four months of the year.

Persephone's myth informs the questions of this spread, reflecting on the duality of her life between the upper and lower worlds.



The Six of Wands depicts a celebratory parade evocative of Demeter's joy when Persephone returns as well as the general joy associated with those who've endured a long, cold winter and celebrate spring's return.

Carl Gustav Jung's controversial *Red Book* was published today in 2009. *The Red Book* reflects a sixteen-year journey into Jung's unconscious mind. Begun in 1913, written and illustrated with psychedelic drawings, this remarkable and personal voyage of Jung's discovery finally became available for the public.

Some scholars believe The Red Book outlines

Jung's descent into madness. Some argue he suffered a psychotic break; others argue the opposite, saying he willingly and consciously chose to embrace his unconscious.

What creates the psychology of you? Jung advanced the concept of archetypes and universal ideas. He claimed each person carries five main archetypes within their unconscious. The Jungian Spread explores these concepts.



Jung's concept of the archetype is critical in the modern study of tarot. Understanding the major arcana as cross-cultural archetypes, it is possible to place any system of belief, dogma, or thought on top of the cards. It is a way to simultaneously understand the cards and other cultures and belief systems.

Cheiro read palms and told fortunes for many famous personalities including Mark Twain, Sarah Bernhardt, Oscar Wilde, Thomas Edison, Grover Cleveland, and the Prince of Wales.

Ready for an all-over analysis of your life? Palm reading begins with a basic examination of lines found on the palm. Size, shape, and texture are then taken into consideration. The questions of this spread come from the meanings of the lines on your palms.




The Ace of Pentacles relates to





Knights are the soldiers of tarot, each representing a particular type of searching, seeking, and adventuring. Each moves at the pace matching their suit. This spread makes use of their exploratory qualities by sending them out on missions for you.



Knights in readings suggest immediate action, energy, or people. They often carry messages, the subject of which is usually found in an accompanying card. Knights add a sense of urgency; when one appears, get ready for action.

This spread is not based on a question; rather, each pair of cards plays upon a quality of the knight's suit. Remove all knights from your deck and place them in the center of your spread. The Visconti-Sforza deck, the oldest tarot deck in existence, lacks a Devil card. No one knows if he was omitted, has been lost, or was simply never thought of. The major arcana of the Visconti-Sforza cards is unnumbered; therefore, the mystery may never be solved.

Dracula is but one manifestation of the Devil figure in literature and popular culture. This spread is based on images found on the Devil card.



The Devil represents power and control issues within oneself and in relation to the people and situations surrounding you. While the Devil can be a rip-roaring good time, it must be tempered with a dose of sanity or you may risk being carried away.

The Temperance card is about conscious flow. It is the effort required while sustaining, mixing, matching, and maintaining equilibrium in life. While the World denotes an effortless flow, Temperance is aware of her energy and situation. The master mixologist, Temperance is actively manipulating her magic to set herself on her true path.

During World War II, Sartre worked as a meteorologist for the French army. He was captured by German troops and spent nine months as a prisoner of war.




Bianca was betrothed to Francesco at the age of six; he was thirty years old at the time. Their marriage, performed when she was sixteen, was a political move to keep Sforza's power tied to Milan.

This spread uses Italian nobility as inspiration for a wedding spread. Questions address the planning of the big day to help the bride and groom make the most informed decisions.



The Four of Wands represents a wedding ceremony. The draped flowers and ivy are similar to the *chuppah*, a traditional Jewish wedding canopy. The Four of Wands represents a time of fulfillment or satisfaction, but it is only momentary. There is more to come.



The Chariot represents a person filled with motivation who achieves success due to personal labor and ingenuity. With its sense of forward motion, the Chariot stresses the ability to take the reins of any situation and stay firmly in the driver's seat. A sense of direction and ability is implied.

Bonfire Night is celebrated with raging bonfires, roasting marshmallows and sausages on sticks, and explosive fireworks in the cold November sky.



Bram Stoker wrote twelve novels, including Dracula, which was originally titled The Undead.







It is considered auspicious if you hear a dog's bark tonight, as Hecate allegedly roams the earth on this night with her pack of hounds.

Are you ready to travel between worlds? Hecate slipped easily between the realms of the living and the dead. Humans have long moved the same way using shamanic arts, the most ancient spiritual practice known to man. This spread is based upon the shaman's three worlds: lower, middle, and upper.



The Hermit and Hecate are both bearers of light—Hecate with her torch and the Hermit with his lantern. Both light the way for those who are prepared to embark on their path.





The Metropolitan Museum of Art's collection includes over two million objects and works of art. The oldest, from Egypt, dates back to 75,000 BCE.



Once there, they give thanks to the Virgin Mary for freeing them from the sixteenth-century plague that struck this lagoon city, and they request she keeps them in good health.

Venice enjoyed an economic boom during the Middle Ages and became a pleasure palace. During this time the popularity of masks grew as prominent society, clergy, and even servants hid their identity while engaging in immoral, unscrupulous acts of carnal pleasure.

What do you display to the outer world? Venice is well known for intricate carnival masks. Concealing who we truly are, masks allow us to role-play as someone or something else. This spread takes a look at the mask you put on when facing the world.



The Fool carries the trickster energy of the deck. Indicative of hiding and playing pretend, in mythology the trickster is the creature who breaks normal rules and displays unconventional behavior. Tricksters can be cunning, foolish, or both, just like the Fool.

Dart through the mist rolling across the lagoon, tiptoe down a cobblestone street, and cast your cards as follows:


This spread is based on the essential qualities of Sagittarius: optimism, honesty, adventure, humor, enthusiasm, expansion, and knowledge.

Catching birds, fish, and even a shark, he remained alive. Years later he would say he hoped no one would ever have to break his record of the longest time at sea on a life raft.

There is evidence suggesting the part of our brain that experiences physical pain also processes social separation. This means social rejection can hurt as much as physical pain. No wonder the experience of loneliness hurts so deeply.

Do you feel cut off from others? Hopefully you will never be lost at sea, but it doesn't mean you won't experience lonely periods in your life when you may feel disconnected from others. This spread looks at why you might feel this way and what you can do to break out of it.

The Brumalia festival marked a break for the Roman senate. Divination was practiced to determine the city's prospects for the coming year.


How are you feeling lately? You can't mention Bacchus, god of wine, without raising a cup. The suit of Cups inspires this spread. Using Cup qualities such as emotions, feelings, and love, this spread examines how you feel.



Reflecting our emotional landscape, watery Cups address how and what we feel at the time we are feeling it. It is the consciousness where romanticism, fantasy, art, and imagination dwell. The cup is receptive, carrying feminine qualities.

Cast the Wisdom of Cups Spread's cards in the shape of a jewel-encrusted chalice.

Tibetan Book of the Dead Spread

Today in Tibet is the memorial festival of Tsongkhapa, a well-known Tibetan religious philosopher. Lamps and lanterns are lit and left on windowsills, and contained fires are lit on monastery roofs. His image is carried in processions.

After the Chinese invasion of Tibet in 1949, over 6,000 monasteries were destroyed. It is estimated that one million Tibetans have died as a result of the brutal Chinese occupation continuing to this day.

Ready for enlightenment? According to the *Tibetan Book of the Dead*, the best opportunity for liberation of the soul happens as death occurs. This is when the soul encounters the five primordial expressions of ultimate cosmic energy, called the Dhyani Buddhas. These are the five principles of a fully awakened consciousness. Each principle informs a question of this spread.



The Tibetan Book of the Dead, like all books of the dead, describes the soul's journey to the afterlife. The entire major arcana could be viewed as an afterlife journey, with each card representing a lesson or challenge for the soul.

Death Card Spread

Vlad the Impaler became ruler of Walachia, a section of Romania, on this day in 1476. Rumors of his excessive cruelty spread, as did his fondness for impaling his enemies, and a few hundred years later Bram Stoker would based the character Dracula on Vlad.

Antiquated times held the Death card as the end of all things—a veil of darkness blotting out all life, a flame extinguished, or a life ended. The Death card is commonly read by modern readers as transformation into a new state of consciousness and the beginning of something new.

The fictional Dracula and nonfictional Vlad are both symbolic of Death. This spread is based on symbols found on the Death card.



If we are sensitive and allow it, the Death card is a literal metaphor that can be our greatest teacher. Reminding us of the value of life, death teaches us how to live.

Use this spread to answer any question. Format your question before casting the spread or simply let the cards answer the questions posed. Pull the Death card from your deck. Place it in the center of the spread and cast your cards around it as follows: 1. Skeleton: What is temporary?

Roman Emperor Marcus Aurelius gave his son Commodus the rank of Supreme Commander of the Roman Legions on this day in 176 CE.

The design for the Emperor has changed very little through the centuries, whereas other iconic cards such as the High Priestess and the Fool have experienced radical symbolic transformations.

Ancient Roman emperors are the ideal archetype for tarot's Emperor card. The Emperor Card Spread is based on symbols found in the Emperor card.



The Emperor represents the idea of power, governmental authority, and male qualities of assertiveness, creative energy, directed action, and troubleshooting. Showing creative potential in action, organized and rational, his authority extends to the material realm but is lacking in the passion belonging to the Empress.

Use this spread to answer any question. Format your question before casting the spread or simply let the cards answer the questions posed. Pull the Emperor card from your deck. Place it in the center of the spread and cast your cards around it as follows: 1. Throne: What is the stability I have created?

Greek and Roman kings and emperors thought their laurel wreaths connected them to Apollo, the sun god, and that the crown embodied his values.


The Wreath Spread uses the intrinsic qualities of the wreath to inform its questions. If you hang a wreath this season, ruminate over these qualities when you cast your eyes upon it.



Wreaths are found on the Six of Wands, the World, and the Seven of Cups. In each case the wreath represents elements of victory and success.

Associated with crossroads, borders, and doorways as the overseer of the space where two realms meet, Hecate is the patron goddess of many witches.

The chief goddess presiding over magic and spells, Hecate is often depicted as a threefigured goddess, connecting her with the Triple Goddess of Maiden, Mother, and Crone.


Hecate's association with poisonous herbs and plants makes for perfect inspiration in the Witch's Cabinet Spread. The questions are based on the items you'll find on hand in any magical person's home.



Hecate often carries a torch to light the way in the underworld. Her torchlight and fierce magical attributes connect her to the Queen of Wands. This queen's wand and flower symbolize her vitality and beauty, which she does not hesitate to use as a weapon. She is encouraging and stimulates creativity around her in subtle yet highly effective ways.

Rosa Parks's Defending Yourself Spread

On this evening in 1945, Rosa Parks made history. A tiny African American woman, a humble seamstress, refused to give up her seat to a white man on a Montgomery, Alabama, bus. Her subsequent arrest and simple act of refusal started a bus boycott that kicked off the civil rights movement.

Rosa Parks sacrificed much when she unintentionally became the symbol for civil rights movements. Arrested and mistreated, she lost her job, then became a public figure. She was either looked to for inspiration or mistreated and abused by a racist public.

Do you need to stand your ground? This spread was created for clarity when you need to defend yourself against cruelty and unfairness.



The Five of Swords reminds you that just because the fight is over, it does not mean the battle is finished. Just like Rosa Parks, who spent the night in jail but later became a major catalyst for change, the Five of Swords reflects only the dispute, not the repercussions.

Believe in yourself and cast the cards as follows:

where he would ultimately die at age seventy-four.

The Eight of Swords is commonly referred to as the bondage card. The female figure is bound and blindfolded —however, once the folds are removed, she will see the world with a new set of eyes.

Bona Dea's Female Power Spread

Today was the Roman festival of Bona Dea, associated with females, fertility, healing, and protection. Bona Dea's rites allowed women the use of wine and blood sacrifice on this night, normally off-limits in their male-centric Roman tradition.

Bona Dea's temple, near the Circus Maximus, was an important center for healing. Harmless snakes roamed the premise, and stores of valuable medicinal herbs were dispensed as needed by its priestesses.

Bona Dea's winter festival excluded men. Conducted in the home, ritually cleansed of all males—even male animals and male portraits—vines and flowers were used as decorations, and a banquet was prepared. Females gathered, female musicians performed, and all normal customs were suspended. For a male to even glimpse at this festival was punishable by blinding. This ultimate girls' night inspires the female questions in this spread.



The Queen of Cups is perhaps the most feminine queen in the deck due to her breadth of empathy. Dreamy, a sincere friend, honest, and loyal, the Queen of Cups revels in the softer aspects of womanhood.

Cast the cards in a lemniscate, the shape of a female reclining:

- 1. What is the essence of womanhood?

- 3. What do female relationships mean to me?
- 4. What is my relationship to my mother?

Garnets were named for the seeds of a pomegranate, amber is the softest gemstone, and in the Middle Ages women wore opals to protect their blond hair.



As a medium, Dion Fortune claimed she did not disturb the spirits of the dead by speaking with them. Rather, she channeled intelligence from a higher plane.





"The 27 Club" refers to the strange number of musicians who died at age 27, often from drug and alcohol abuse. Jim Morrison, Janis Joplin, Jimi Hendrix, Kurt Cobain, Robert Johnson, Brian Jones of the Rolling Stones, and Amy Winehouse all died at age 27.

Jim Morrison's tragic story of drug and alcohol use is an extreme example of addiction. We can be addicted to substances, thoughts, patterns, ideas, behaviors, *etc*. The Addiction Spread offers help and insight to break any addiction.



The Five of Cups is an addiction card. The addiction was in the overturned cups. The black cloak depicts a person lost in addiction. Will they drink what is left, thereby indulging the addiction, or cross the bridge to freedom?





To cast the coveted role of Scarlett O'Hara, 1,400 interviews and 90 screen tests were performed before Vivian Leigh was finally selected.



Tea absorbs odors around it. For odors on your hands —anything from garlic to fish—simply pour some cold tea over your fingers to remove the smell.







This spread is an unexpected present for you. Unwrap to discover what the magic of the holiday season has in store for you all through the year.



The Six of Cups is the card of gifts from the heart and generosity to yourself and others. At times it is regarded as a walk down memory lane, especially appropriate as Christmas seems, more than any other day, a time for childhood reflections.

Take a moment to thank the tarot and honor yourself for all the soul-searching, divining, hard work, and effort you put forth this year. Make a solid promise to enjoy your day, relax, and be thankful for the goodness in your life.

Shuffle your deck. When satisfied, remove the top five cards without looking at them. Place the remaining deck in front of you. Build a house of cards—or, in this case, "wrapping" around your gift—by creating a five-card house around the deck.

When ready, begin to remove the "wrapping" of your deck, one card at a time. Contemplate each card as you remove and find the message within it. When you have removed all five cards, the deck remains in front of you.

The top card is your big gift. Turn it over to receive the gift tarot bestows upon you for the next year. This is your special card, containing a meaning just for you.



Kwanzaa Spread

Today is the beginning of Kwanzaa, a holiday created by Maulana Karenga as the first specifically African American holiday. Its name derives from a Swahili phrase meaning "fruits of the harvest."

Kwanzaa is not a religious holiday but a cultural holiday that can be practiced by anyone, and it is often celebrated alongside other holidays such as Christmas.

Kwanzaa celebrates seven principles for seven days. It is on these principles the Kwanzaa Spread is based.




The Hierophant links to any brand of dogma or learning, religious or not. He stands for a shared cultural heritage and following certain disciplines. He reminds you of where to place your faith and why ritual and ceremony hold an important place in society.

- 7. Faith: What do I believe in?



Fear Spread

Today is the Meeting of Nine Evils day in the Buddhist kingdom of Bhutan. The entire population stays home on this day. It is believed no one should venture outdoors and jobs done today would bear bad fruit, and it is the worst day to start a journey or begin a new venture. Any bad deed performed on this day multiplies negative karma.

Bhutan remained tucked away in the eastern Himalayas, in total isolation from the rest of the world, until recently. This preserved its deep Buddhist traditions.

What are you afraid of? This day has its place in Bhutanese culture and lasts only one day. It does not speak to any larger issue of fear and avoidance. The Fear Spread explores what locks you down in fear—what keeps you in stasis rather than moving forward with confidence.




The popular Celtic Cross Spread clearly shows the fear/desire connection in the 9 position of the spread. It stands as a reminder that people often fear what they desire most.

London's Westminster Abbey opened on this day in 1065 and is the final resting place of over seventeen monarchs and the site of sixteen royal weddings. If every person laid within the abbey rose at once, it would be the greatest cocktail party the world has ever

Two ghosts have been reported in the abbey: a floating monk and a World War I soldier.

seen. Bones resting within include Geoffrey Chaucer, Charles Darwin, Isaac Newton, Charles Dickens, Thomas Hardy, Queen Elizabeth 1, and Mary, Queen of Scots, among others.

Summation of Spread

Ecclesiastical architecture's incredibly complex forms contain rich symbolism and meaning behind it. This spread is based on layout and architecture found within a Gothic-style building.



The Hierophant, originally titled the Pope, is connected to cathedrals, abbeys, temples, and all religious architecture, as these are the dwelling and teaching places of hierophants.

The tarot court cards thrive inside us as personality traits and potentials. Macbeth desires literal kinghood and meets a bloody end in his attempt to grasp the crown. Kings of every suit represent acting with authority, certainty, and decisive action.
